THE LAW SCHOOL GRADING SYSTEM

Prior to 1969-70 the passing grade in all courses as well as the comprehensive examination was 70%. In computing the course average, the courses were weighted by credit hour. This weighted average and the comprehensive examination grade were then added together and divided by two to determine the semester average. The cumulative average was determined by adding the semester averages and dividing by the number of semesters. Beginning with the 1969-70 school year, the Law School discontinued averages, class ranks, and the comprehensive examination. The grading system for courses was converted to Honors (H), High Pass (HP), Pass (P), and Fail (F). Where courses were taken overseas, the appropriate grade legends are explained in the semester data. Beginning with students admitted for the 1972-73 academic year, the grading system is as follows: A, B, C, D and F with no numeric equivalences. Beginning with students admitted for the 1981-1982 academic year, the grading system is as follows: A (4.0), A - (3.67), B+ (3.25), B (3.0), B- (2.75), C+ (2.25), C (2.0), C- (1.75), D (1.0), F (0.0). Effective the Fall of 1986, the grading system is as follows: A (4.0), A - (3.67), B+ (3.33), B (3.0), B- (2.67), C+ (2.33), C (2.0), C- (1.67), D (1.0), F (0.0). Effective in the Fall of 1988, the grading system is as follows: A (4.0), A - (3.667), B+ (3.333), B (3.000), B-(2.667), C+ (2.333), C (2.000), C- (1.667), D (1.000), F (0.000). Beginning in the Fall of 1995, the grade of U calculates as 0.000.

AVERAGE COMPUTATION AND SEMESTER DATA EXPLANATION

Presentation of Each Semester's Data Since September 1960 May Vary Slightly From the Data Explanation Listed Below.

The data posted under the listing of courses for each semester gives the student's progress to date including grade point averages. Student averages are calculated by dividing the total credit hours attempted into total quality points (course grade points x credit hours). In some cases, the numbers posted to the right of, or below the average are prefixed with the letter "C" indicates the semester credit hours carried; the number prefixed with the letter "P" indicates the semester credit hours passed for the respective averages.

A percentile rating, when indicated, utilizes the cumulative average data and indicates the percentage of students in the same college and class year who rank below the student.

The college average (effective September 1965 - May 1974) is the average of courses taken after the freshman year.

The GPA hour totals on the transcript reflect only those courses included in the averages. Transfer credits, the grades "P" and "S" shown on the transcript are not included in the total GPA hours nor are they included in the averages.

The only courses included in the averages are those taken at the University of Notre Dame (including its foreign study programs) and Saint Mary's College, Notre Dame, Indiana.

Prior to Fall 2007, Saint Mary's College foreign study programs were also included in the averages.

The total credits acceptable toward a degree must be approved by the dean of the student's college, and they may vary from the total credits affecting the averages.

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COURSE NUMBERING SYSTEM

From 1970 through Spring 2005, the Following Course Numbering System was Adopted:

Courses numbered 101 through 199 are freshman courses; the 200 series are sophomore courses; the 300 series are junior courses and the 400 series are for senior and first year law student courses (the latter are open to graduate students for graduate credit with permission of the department chairman and/or the graduate school dean). Courses numbered 501 through 599 are fifth year courses in five year programs, first year MBA, second year law courses, and graduate courses open to gualified undergraduates with the permission of the chairman of the department and/or class professor. Third year law courses; second year MBA; and all graduate courses which are restricted to graduate students are numbered in the 600's and higher.

Beginning in Summer 2005, all courses offered are five numeric digits long (e.g. ENGL 43715).

The first digit of the course number indicates the level of the course

- ENGL 0 X XXX = Pre-College course
- ENGL 1 X XXX = Freshmen Level course
- ENGL 2 X XXX = Sophomore Level course
- ENGL 3 X XXX = Junior Level course
- ENGL 4 X XXX = Senior Level course
- ENGL 5 X XXX = 5th Year Senior / Advanced Undergraduate Course
- ENGL 6 X XXX = 1st Year Graduate Level Course
- ENGL 7 X XXX = 2nd Year Graduate Level Course (MBA / LAW)
- ENGL 8 X XXX = 3rd Year Graduate Level Course (MBA / LAW)
- ENGL 9 X XXX = Upper Level Graduate Level Course

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
